ALBERTA'S LITTLE BIG SECRET

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Located within Mountain View County – about an hour from both Red Deer and Calgary – Sundre punches above its weight as an economic hub.

Some communities are locked into a single industry, like oil or agriculture. Sundre is different because of its strong and diverse economy. During Alberta's economic downturn associated with the decline in the price of oil, Sundre experienced growth.

Although steeped in a history of ranching and farming, its proximity to primary resources has provided the traditional source of its prosperity while diversifying into cannabis, healthcare, and tourism.



Meanwhile, the nearby mountains continue to define its culture and support its livability with recreational opportunities. The area's quality of living is superb; constant investments into infrastructure, local amenities and beautification is driving demand for housing and increasing the workforce.

CANNABIS

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The Mountain View
County area is becoming
a major centre of cannabis
production, and Sundre is
a centre of this activity.

Within 30 minutes of Sundre, other companies like Sundial (Olds) and Aurora (Cremona) have established operations.

Directly in Sundre, Candre Cannabis has constructed

a substantial growing facility and partnered with Dope Automation on the value-added side. With plans to expand their new 43,000 sq ft operation to almost 500,000 sq ft within three years, it will employ 300 people.

Ten minutes north of Sundre's town limits in Clearwater County, Element GP is constructing an 84,000 sq ft facility, that once complete, will employ 200 employees.

With 500 new jobs on the horizon in the cannabis industry alone, our growth trajectory is obvious.

MINING, QUARRYING, OIL & GAS

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Much of Sundre and its surrounding area was built on an ancient riverbed.

Meaning that beneath all the overburden is prime aggregate – rock that can be manufactured into gravel and concrete. A major quarrying operation exists in Mountain View County, just outside Town limits. Aggregate development is ongoing.

Sundre is also part of the Cardium play, a major oil field that has spawned countless oil and gas service businesses, like Capital Pressure.

Oil and gas servicing also led to the development of major local exporting businesses like Black Gold Rush and ACL Manufacturing.

FORESTRY, LUMBER

& BIOMASS

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West Fraser Mills is the largest lumber producer in North America.

Their Sundre facility is the largest employer in the area, providing livelihoods for hundreds of families.

The mill produces lumber of all types, including laminated veneer lumber (LVL).

The industry in the area is supported by hundreds of contractors and smaller feeder mills, like Gap Creek Wood Products and Coleman Forest Products.

Forestry also adds to the vast supply of biomass available within Sundre's catchment area. With more than 77 million tonnes of theoretical biomass potential available within a 100 km radius of town, opportunities exist for investment and innovation.

HEALTH & EDUCATION

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With a regional hospital featuring 24 hour emergency care, two clinics, and a state-of-theart seniors care facility, Sundre is home to at least 14 doctors.

There are more doctors per capita in Sundre than any other rural hospital in Alberta, with some still accepting new patients.

Our hospital is also a teaching hospital in partnership with the University of Calgary, meaning local physicians stay at the forefront of changes in medicine.

We're home to an elementary school, high school, multiple daycares, and a new Campus Alberta Central learning site, offering Red Deer College post-secondary courses.

The public sector is a major source of employment, representing all levels of government.

TOURISM, HOSPITALITY & RETAIL

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Sundre's downtown business sector represents the heart of our community. Over 100 businesses are located downtown, and over 300,000 sq ft of built commercial space is available in the C-1 district. At an average of approximately \$14 per sq ft, downtown commercial lease rates are very reasonable and competitive.

The Town is a sub-regional service and amenity hub for the local geographic area, which extends west into the mountains through Mountain View County and into Clearwater County.

Adventure and Activities

Sundre is a major outdoor and adventure destination featuring: golfing, camping, hiking, biking, cross country skiing, ATV riding, sledding, horseback riding, rafting, kayaking and the most wild horses in Alberta

Many also come to discover our local culture by shopping and dining, visiting the Sundre Pioneer Village Museum, Bergen Rocks International Sculpture Park, our Performing Arts Centre, and attending local events.






